

Ruidoso Update!




At the time of cancellation, our first priority was to ensure the safety of our attendees and the families in the area. Once we got everyone safely notified, we began the process of identifying how to go about "unwinding" the first national convention MAFCA has ever been forced to cancel.

Both organizations committed to refunding fees paid by attendees to the Southwest Model A's for the National Convention requested. We knew this could be a substantial financial burden, estimated at the time to be over \$85,000.00 more than the current, available cash balance. Even though this was a huge dollar amount, MAFCA stood ready, willing and able to back up The Southwest Model A's to completely meet all their financial obligations, as we do with any chapter that hosts a national event.


National Event News



A Visit to the Model A Museum

I was surprised that my GPS led me through back roads to get there. I didn't expect it to be in the middle of nowhere. It's a large campus surrounded by farmland. I've heard about this museum for a while and wanted to see it. The articles in the Restorer piqued my interest. Housed on the Gilmore campus, the Model A building is separate from the main hall. I was so interested in seeing the Model A exhibits, that I rushed through the rest of the

Pleated Paper Fuel Filter Elements

Ford originally used a fine mesh brass screen at the top of the glass fuel strainer bowl that's mounted to the Model A firewall. The bowl gives a place for water to settle into (water is heavier than gasoline) and a place for dirt and rust particles to collect.

The screen also keeps these particles from traveling down to the carburetor (where you have another screen!). With all these screens, I think Ford knew that gasoline supplies at the time were prone to contamination (more than today).





Many people have started to install a small pleated paper filter element in the glass bowl instead of the brass screen.

I'm not so sure it's needed; I think the brass screen is enough. The Model A has no fuel pump, it relies only on gravity feed, and I'm concerned about adding another restriction to the fuel flow.

But IF you use one of these paper filters, you need to know that the rust, dirt, etc. is trapped INSIDE the paper element, not on the outside of it like you'd think. Therefore, you can be collecting a lot junk inside the filter, plugging up the filter element on the inside, and not even know it. One day, you lose all your power and



the engine really acts like it is starving for fuel. You thought you would see the rust and dirt collect on the outside of the filter... but you don't. Surprise! (I hate surprises!)

So, if you are going to use these pleated paper filters, get into the habit of replacing them regularly, maybe once a year, since you can't see how dirty they are inside. And carry a spare filter and gasket with you in the car. It's a pretty easy thing to swap out in a parking lot. Kind of messy, but it can be done without tools. Use some disposable gloves and you won't smell like gas for the rest of the day.

That's all for now. Keep driving, help each other out, and Have a Model A Day! Jim

Model A Tools, covered in Area 17 of The Model A Restoration Guidelines and Judging Standards, is a good area with which to become familiar. When you go to a swap meet, you need to know what you are looking for since there are a variety of items that look about the same but may be a Model T, Model A or V-8 item or even an item that was part of a tool set from a different vehicle manufacturer. The most common tools are pliers, screw drivers and wrenches. These tools are inexpensive and often incorrect.

These adjustable wrenches look great with the forger's name and Ford Script visible on the upper one

and the wonderful Ford script on the one beneath. The top one is correct while the bottom one with no forger's mark and a misplaced Ford script is probably from a Ford V-8 tool kit.


